**DESCRIPTION**

This documentary records the events and aftermath of the terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center in New York on September 11, 2001 through news footage and material shot at Ground Zero twelve days later. It goes on to present views on why the attacks occurred. As a Vermont-based company it explores the perceptions of people in Vermont. It asks them questions about the root causes of the attacks, about the government's policy to deal with the crisis, about the meaning of patriotism, about the effects of globalization, about the media and its coverage of the crisis, about the government's energy policy and foreign policy, and about how the rest of the world perceives the United States. *and all this madness* is about anger, rage, war, despair and destruction. Where does it come from? Where does it lead? Is there hope for Americans to live peacefully without fear? Is there hope for the world and humanity to exist in peace and harmony? This film was created with the intention of generating discussion about these issues amongst Vermonters, Americans, in fact all people everywhere because these issues are affecting the survival of us all.
