

Director's comments

The Homestead Act is a short film about erosion and the aesthetic possibilities of decay. The title, based on the 19th Century United States Federal law, is the third part of the larger tetralogy titled *The Dead Sea Scrolls*. Each of the four segments chronicles the history of destructive effects of decay. Erosion, which is devastating to farmers, is also used to alter cinematic images and allow the audience to imagine the missing pieces of cinema's past.
